# Celebrating Saints

# Saint Mark

For mortals it is impossible, but not for God; for God all things are possible.

#### Feast day: April 25 Patron Saint of Venice, lawyers, artists, prisoners, opticians, and pharmacists

The Evangelist Mark was the son of Mary of Jerusalem (Acts 12:12), whose home served as a meeting place for the apostles. He accompanied St Paul on his first missionary journey with his cousin St Barnabas. In the Acts of the Apostles, he is referred to as John Mark. The oldest and the shortest of the four Gospels was written by St Mark, for the gentile converts in Rome after the death of saints Peter and Paul (between A.D. 60 – 70). Mark is said to have been the first bishop of Alexandria, Egypt, where he died a martyr while being dragged through the streets. In 828, his relics were stolen from Alexandria and taken to the Cathedral of Venice, Italy. St Mark's symbol is the winged lion.



# Saint Philip Neri

The Lord grants in a moment what we may have been unable to obtain in dozen years.

#### Feast Day: May 26 Patron Saint of religious, laughter, humor, and joy

Philip Neri was born in Florence in 1515 and was educated by the Dominicans. He experienced conversion at 18 and left for Rome. He began to work with the poor and the young, among whom he fostered Christian life. Ordained to the priesthood in 551, he founded the Congregation of the Oraton, where spiritual reading, singing, and

1551, he founded the Congregation of the Oratory, where spiritual reading, singing, and works of charity were practiced. He excelled in the love of neighbor and evangelical simplicity with a joyous service to God. His life was centered on his complete surrender to God, praying, 'Lord, don't trust Philip!' He died at the age of 80; much loved and respected, he is still known as the 'Apostle of Rome'.

#### Saint Mariam Thresia Chiramel Let the Cross of the Lord be with me

#### Feast Day: June 8

# Patron Saint of the universal Church, fathers, unborn children, immigrants, workers, pilgrims, carpenters, happy death

A mystic and religious, Mariam Theresia was born in Puthenchira, Kerala, on April 26, 1876. Since childhood, Theresia consecrated her life to God and the Holy Family. After her mother's death at twelve, Theresia began to discern her vocation. In imitation of Jesus, she helped the poor, nursed the sick, and visited and comforted the lonely people of her parish. She was subjected to dreadful diabolic attacks and various physical illnesses. She was also blessed with the stigmata and other mystical gifts. In 1914, Thresia established a prayer house of solitude, later called the Congregation of the Holy Family. Even after she died in 1926, the Congregation continued to grow. St. Mariam Thresia was canonized by Pope Francis on October 13, 2019.



Thirdly Gift Deed - This minimizes chances of disputes, here one voluntarily gifts movable/ immovable property to another.



## **'LOOKING BACK, LOOKING FORWARD'**

A journey into the unknown, a journey both mysterious and marvellous, a journey of Faith and Hope in darkness... Malad? Malwani? St. Anthony's? A date pre-planned by God for me- 14th June 1992- My first entry into this sacred 'land' which was soon to become God's fertile field... and my home for 17 memorable years!

#### Down Memory lane

-Eve of the Feast of St. Anthony when having been invited to give the homily on 'Prayer' at the novena Mass, I stood before a sea of unfamiliar faces, but surrounded by an ambience of deep devotion, rapt attention and obvious commitment as it was a rainy day that did not deter their presence. It was then that I sensed from within- a quiet clarion call to me- 'God wants you to work here!'

- I had shelved this thought when the second milestone event occurred on **5th July 1992**- the inaugural Mass



of the Basic Christian Communities [BCC] concelebrated by Bishop Bosco Penha [ who had already prepared the initial ground for thisl and Fr. Vincent Gonsalves, the then Parish Priest. Five of us, FILMC Team members [Bp. Bosco's team for the Formation and Involvement of the Laity in the Mission of the Church] were there to present to the parishioners, the need and importance of starting the BCCs in this parish, following the directive of the Archdiocese of Bombay. However, Bishop graciously asked those present if they were ready for this. There were doubts, mixed opinions and feelings but ultimately the Holy Spirit prevailed. The parishioners asked for a team member to assist them in this task. It was at that crucial moment I timidly dared my 'Yes'- vet encouraged by my inner Spirit- I am ready, send me Bishop! This began a great saga of events for me. Hand in hand with Jesus, my lifelong partner, I began my Mission of working in this parish to build God's Family through the BCCs.



I didn't plan, I didn't need to foresee the 'What? How? Where? I knew for sure It was His initiative, **His** plan. I never doubted the Spirit's Guidance once I had 'set my hand to the plough'. As there were no religious sisters here I stayed overnight with different families each time I came to Malwani [from Sophia College] in order to visit every family by day with the help of a local person, and call for a meeting at 8.00 pm to conduct 'Awareness programmes' for the parishioners. In this way, by November 1992 we had 5 communities formed, 2 in Marve and 3 in Malwani village [called communities A, B, C,] each with a set of Animators. This method was followed in the years that followed, with help from my sisters of the Sacred Heart, later joined by the Sisters of St.Joseph of Tarbes who took up their residence at St. Anthony's. The welcome we received from the parishioners was truly heart-warming and encouraging for the journey forward...

FAST FORWARD TO THE NOW! During the 30-year period that has followed, much has happened at St. Anthony's. Blessings have abounded as the BCCs now called SCCs grew in number to 45 in 2022-23. The regular involvement and participation in a variety of activities have empowered our lav faithful. both individually and collectively to develop latent talent, leadership qualities and spiritual gifts through the 3 Pillars of the SCC-Community building and Team work, Faith formation especially through Gospel sharing, Reaching out to the marginalized in new, creative ways. I have been overwhelmed time and again, to witness God's Work through our parishioners while supporting them at the grassroots. Visits to families, especially to the sick, the aged, the bereaved have challenged us to reach out to others with the Heart and Mind of Christ.

Simultaneously, the Cells and Associations have multiplied to cater to the different needs of our people. I had the special joy and grace to witness the rebirth of the Bible cell, the formation of the Family cell, the Hope and Life movement as a separate entity affiliated to the all- Bombay level, the start of a Neighbourhood Children's Council [NCC], later a JOY group [Jesus,Others,You] while assisting these as a spiritual guide. The lay coordinators and animators have received much support of the clergy and religious as spiritual directors, and from our

lay mentors who have assisted the growth of the communities. As a Resource person for training programmes I have always found these a challenge and joy to prepare and conduct. As member of the PPC and executive team of the parish I have always felt happy to share my God-given gifts, leadership skills, and creativity in team work with the clergy and laity. There have been ups and downs as well but through the struggle has come new life. As counsellor and as a woman religious I have been privileged to enter the inner 'sanctuary' of people's hearts and homes, to be one with them in their joys, successes and pain. Youth animation through interactive sessions with them have kept me youthful and a life-long learner! The climax has been for me the completion of 30 years of the SCCs and of our tenure as religious of the Sacred Heart at St. Anthony's with the celebration of our PEARL IUBILEE on 13th November 2022.



As I look back on the 17 years spent fruitfully in this 'Parish Family' I feel bowled over by a deep sense of mystery and gratitude firstly to my God who through a close partnership with Jesus as my Good Shepherd led me here into hitherto unknown terrain: to all our parishioners for making this for me a 'HOME' away from home by their cooperation, care and concern, their sincere appreciation and respect for us. Praver will always be the inseparable bond between us.Limited by the space of this Magazine, I summarize my million memories, words and feelings in the succinct words of Dag Hammarskjold: 'For all that has been, THANKS: For all that will be, YES!' He who led me here will lead me onward I know, for 'He who has called you /us is FAITHFUL AND HE WILL DO IT'. [1 Thess. 5:24] May St. Anthony's grow from splendour to splendour with God's Grace!

# "Look after the land and the land will look after you, destroy the land and it will destroy you." Words that resonate loud and clear in the present scenario!

At long last, there is an iota of awareness being raised to believe that "we don't live on earth, we are only passing through." The celebration of Earth Day in 2008, was a great beginning and has paved the way for a series of wake-up calls to **Save the Planet**.

Joining the bandwagon of scientists, researchers and the 'who-is-who' in the mainstream, the emphasis is on educating our children today, as they are the ones who will be facing the vagaries of nature tomorrow: a future that is already raising issues from pollution to endangered species to global warming.

Global warming has reached unprecedented heights. Each year, new records are being broken. Planet earth is heating up at an alarming pace and statistics prove that it is warmer today, than it has been in 800,000 years. The world's resources are being depleted, more than they can be regenerated.

Some of the pertinent questions asked are:

How much more time does the world have to take corrective measures?World scientists have confirmed that climate change could be irreversible by 2030.Instantaneous action is needed to evade the disastrous effects of global warming.

Everyone can do their bit to avert the effects of climate change, if we act NOW.... We must switch to green energy today.



#### What is green energy?

# Papiyas

This ritual, is a tradition handed down over generations....

Taking over from their forefathers, the present group of 27 members of our Parish, move about from cross to cross, during the Holy season of Lent, at the dead of night, chanting prayers and reciting the Stations of the Cross at each cross. It is a call to Christians, to wake up from their sleep, get down on their knees and pray and ask for God's forgiveness.

The call in Marathi goes as follows: "Bhavando, utha tumche neezemanche, deemi ghala, lazaar kara, ek Amche Bapala.......'

This is followed by the soul-stirring, heart-piercing rendition of "Papiya re nirbhagya..." This lamentable chant in tones similar to Gregorian chants are in East Indian dialect. Listening to their mournful chants can be a hair raising experience and can send shivers down one's spines, especially when one hears them at the dead of night. They also shroud themselves in black or blue or brown tunics.

They play an instrument, known as crotalus (matraca), or 'clapper'. It is a wooden, liturgical rattle that replaces altar bells during the celebration of the Tridentine Paschal Triduum at the end of Lent in the Catholic Church.

In our Zone (Kharodi), this year, St Anthony Papiya Group, visited Rathodi, Alitalao, Enaswadi, Malwani, Chickoowadi and Marve village. They also visited Dongri and Tarodi Parish.

These groups become active from the Saturday night after Ash Wednesday and visit villages and other Parishes, every Saturday. The frequency becomes more active from Palm Sunday and on Maundy Thursday.

They organize themselves into groups of 10 to 20 persons. Traditional Papiyas from one village, would visit the neighbouring villages, and vice versa, No two groups would come face with each other. If both groups had the occasion to travel and would cross paths, then the group that spotted the passing group would hide behind the bunds (baands) of the field, till the other group passed by. As tradition goes, villagers would keep a kettle of hot tea at the foot of the cross for the Papiyas.

The Papiyas are representative of the apostles Peter, James and John, who accompanied Jesus to the Garden of



Gethsemane, where Jesus prayed and during His 'Agony' on the Mount of Olives.

As this Tradition was dying with the present generation, (MGP) Mobai Goathan Panchayat, is promoting more villages to join the Papiya band of men and visit other Parishes across Mumbai, to ensure that this religious tradition is revived and passed on to our future generations.

Groups from Kurla and Uttan Parishes visited our Parish this year.

In the bygone years, the St. Anthony Papiya Group has visited Kurla, Juhu, Vileparle, Kalina, Vakola,Orlem, Chembur,Manori Gorai,Culvem, Chavli, Uttan, Bhayandar, Chembur and Marouli village.

May this tradition live on...it is a beautiful legacy and a reminder to repentance! - Bosco Patel Infant Jesus Community, Zone-5




