CELEBRATING Saints



St. John Bosco (1815 - 1888) Run, jump, shout but do not sin...!

Feast day: 31st January

Patron Saint of youth, editors, magicians and juvenile delinquents

Don Bosco (Italian for Father) was born in a humble village east of Turin in 1815 during the blood-thirsty Italian and Industrial revolution. His father's death had a deep impact on his young mind and mission. He dedicated his life to rescue the homeless, abandoned and orphaned children, provide for their basic necessities and inspire their faith. Motivated by the life of St. Francis de Sales, Don Bosco founded

the order of the Salesians of Don Bosco (SDB) in 1859. He established several youth centres that offered basic education, occupational skills and above all the love of God. He believed in educating the whole person - body and soul - through a unique method known as Salesian Preventive System. His most famous and canonized student was St. Dominic Savio. Don Bosco was endlessly loved by his 'rascals' for he relentlessly tried to win them over 'with kindness and love'. His life and ministry encourages us to do the same.

St. Blaise

Feast Day: 3rd February

Patron Saint of veterinarians, wool workers, stonecutters and physicians

According to legend, St. Blaise was a physician by profession and a man of extraordinary virtue. He was appointed Bishop of his native city of Sebaste in Armenia (today Turkey). However, under the persecutions of Licinius, the co-Emperor of Rome, St. Blaise was arrested, tormented by a wool-comber's brush and beheaded for refusing to abjure Christ. He is famously invoked against throat diseases for he is said to have saved the life of a young boy who was choking to death on a fish-bone.

Even to this day, the 'blessing of St. Blaise' is commonly given by touching the throats of the faithful with two pronged candles held in X form.

St. Joseph The Silent Knight

Feast Day: 19th March

Patron Saint of the Catholic Church, unborn children, fathers, families, immigrants, workers, pilgrims, carpenters, of a happy death etc.

A fascinating figure in the story of salvation is Joseph of Nazareth - a man of great silence. We know not of a single syllable he ever spoke and yet his actions, eloquent and enigmatic, speak volumes of his 'justness'. He was chosen by God to be the foster-father of the Incarnate Word. We know he was a carpenter and came from the

royal Davidic lineage. Joseph was not rich for during the Presentation of Christ, he offered the sacrifice of two turtledoves, allowed only for those who could not afford a lamb (Luke 2:24). However, generous and caring at heart, Joseph chose to be selfless and obedient to God and joined Mary in saying 'yes' to the divine plan of salvation. Truly his actions speak louder than words.

Special Event - Workshop on "Parent-Teen Relationships"

(Confirmation students and their parents) From a Parent's Point of View

The New Year saw a new endeavour to deepen "Parent-Teen" relationships on Jan 5th, 2020 at the St. Anthony School Annexe. This workshop was organised by the Animators of the confirmands under the able guidance of Fr. Vinay Kamath. It began at 10:15 a.m. with Sr. Manisha leading us in prayer.

The session was conducted by Deacon Jaime and his spouse Ligia da Fonseca, who belong to the Archdiocesan Family Commission in Mumbai, as well as the "Pontifical Council for the Family", Rome, and are well experienced in this area.

Parents and children were divided into groups, and took turns to express the issues they faced with each other. It turned out that the teens had a shorter list, mostly of parents being controlling, not giving them enough freedom, treating them like children, comparing them with siblings/others. The parents on the contrary had a longer list, like mobile addiction, rebellious behaviour, not listening to parents, peer and social-media influence, making unreasonable demands, squabbling with siblings, dis-organised and untidy behaviour.

Jaime and Ligia, from their experience, decoded the issues between parent/teens. Their insight into the psychology of parents and the rebellious nature of teens in their growing-up years



provided an insight into the struggle both face in communicating concerns and feelings.

Finally, Jaime and Ligia conducted an exercise in which the teens were asked to write two positive points about their Mother and Father and the Parents had to write two positive points about their children. The parents and teens got emotional as they read to each other what they had written.

The session concluded with both groups praying for each other.

As a parent, I was able to relate to the children's grievances and found the session enriching. May many parents and teens understand better the many facets of parent/child relationships, so that their minds and hearts may be open to create better families, the foundation of society

During this face-off between confirmands and their parents emotions ran high on both sides – parents were upset especially with the mobile phone addiction and the limited interaction their children (now youth) choose to have with them, while we mentioned the low trust our parents had in us with freedom a distant dream.

But Deacon Jaime and Ligia showed both sides the mirror - teenage is a phase of life that parents also went through and probably behaved just the same as their children do today. The need of the hour is - Understanding, Love and Acceptance by parents - and from children the belief that parents want only the best for them.

Deacon Jaime and Ligia were not the least bit shy to share that their own children were just the same, giving us several incidents of similar situations they faced and how they managed. Parents needed to be parents to their children and not friends. It is only then that children will respect their parents and take the advice of parents seriously.

The moment that brought tears to my eyes was when we had to tell each other 2 good points - both realised that not all was negative. And one more touching moment was the prayer that we had to say for each other. Tears rolled down my cheeks, and in my heart I know my Mum and Dad love me endlessly, and I am sure I love them too even more!

Thank you Deacon Jaime and Ligia for this fruitful session that helped us open up and overcome the resentment we sometimes feel in our relationship with each other!

Recently I heard about the son of one of my acquaintances, about 38 years of age who was rather frail. The father had abandoned the family, so the mother worked as a domestic to support them. The boy too took up a small job in an imitation jewellery factory, but suddenly fell ill. His condition was getting worse, but they could not afford medical treatment.

I visited their home with my sister and found that he had given up hope, thinking he would die. Along with neighbours, we collected some money and took him to Shatabadi hospital, Kandivali, where tests were done. The report showed that he was in the last stages of TB, but no one was ready to accompany him to the municipal hospital because of the long waiting hours involved.

We counselled him and assured him that we would stand by him; regularly took him for treatment, gave him healthy home-cooked food to ensure energy needed for the strong drugs, and encouraged him with texts from Scripture and with prayer.

My family supported me, especially during long visits to the municipal hospital. I experienced strength and Jesus helped me to help him. After treatment over the last year, I feel so happy to see that he has recovered and is back to health.

My little effort helped save a life. I thank and praise God for working through me.

Animator Vanessa Essaki (The Four 'C's of "Cluster Revival")

After the Opening Prayer, Sr. Manisha introduced the topic of "Gospel sharing" which is the first step to be included in every meeting of the SCC Core Group. Demonstrating through a small group, with participants of different ages, languages and backgrounds, Sr. Manisha took us through each of the "Seven Steps" of the gospel sharing method used in our parish. It was a valuable experience to be replicated in our meetings.

After a refreshment break, Animator Vanessa Essaki of Borivali shared her spiritual secrets with us.. Her training entailed "The Four C's Of Cluster Revival" - "Connect - Care - Coordinate - Collaborate".

Connect: a two-way bond between self and community clusters, building trust for support when needed.

Care: understanding needs of clusters, enhancing value and talent acquisition banks.

Coordinate: the Church and its services to the families; encourage and motivate Church and community- related programmess and

associations. Be the knowledge base and instant reference whenever required.

Collaborate: Build a database of families, identify individuals needing faith-revival, rebuild faith marriages where needed, support revival in belief.

The acronym Animator spells out the magic:

A - Available (Time & Commitment)

N - Nurture (Care for the families)

I - Involve (Wholeheartedly)

M - Meeting (Skills & Brainstorm)

A - Approach (Attitude)

T - Take initiative (Take Interest)

O - Observe (Be Vigilant)

R - Responsible (Be So)

Finally, on 22nd December, the sisters, volunteers and 2 confirmation animators went

to Dudhani (a village in Gujarat) where we distributed rice, dal, bed-sheets, blankets, towels, mats, biscuits, old clothes, steel plates and glasses to 100 families and 50 children in the boarding school.

Sister Martha, who leads our group, said "Jesus is the light of the world. As His followers, we can spread light in the darkest places, give hope to the broken-hearted, peace to troubled and disappointed people, and bring a smile to their faces. We may not be able to satisfy all their needs but we try to bring some improvement in their present situation".

We, the volunteers of Sneha Sagar Society of the Helpers of Jesus and the confirmation students were blessed with the opportunity of sharing the joy and peace of Christmas with many.

On 8th December 2019, a group of 22 budding "Clean-up enthusiasts" armed with a lot of energy and determination set out at 5 am from Kharodi after a short prayer together. Our destination was 'Our Lady of the sea Church', Uttan.



Grandparents as a LIGHT in Church and family life

A Vatican conference on the pastoral care of the elderly entitled, "The Richness of Many Years of Life" is underway in Rome.

The event, which is being organized by the Dicastery for

Laity, Family and Life is looking at how to deal with the culture of "discarding" the elderly, as well as their role in the family, and their particular vocation in the Church.

One of the participants is Catherine Wiley, founder of the Catholic Grandparents Association, whose mission it is "to help Grandparents pass on the faith and keep prayer in the heart of family life".

Speaking to Vatican News, Wiley describes this conference as "absolutely of its time; it is perfect timing for this to bring together likeminded people who can share views and ideas and commit to each other to just not talk the talk but to walk the walk."

Catherine, who is a grandparent herself, emphasises the vital role the elderly and grandparents can play in the life of the Church. There is an opportunity, she says, to look at ages and stages of grandparents and the elderly and how they fit into the community.

"We need in every community and in every parish a ministry for grandparents and the elderly, not just somebody who's slotted into the role because they have nothing else to do; somebody who is part and parcel, who's competent, who's professional, who can see the needs in the parish a mile off." Loneliness and the elderly Catherine points out that some of the elderly people attending daily Mass in our churches can experience loneliness and fall victim to depression. "Nobody calls on them, there aren't enough priests

anymore to call on them; they're worried about their last will and testaments; they're worried about end of life issues; they're worried about their families not coming to see them and I'm thinking, 'how can this happen in a community so close, so loving?'. But it's happened", she says.

She stresses that there are so many older lay people who have the wisdom, experience and the skills to be a vital asset in the community and it's important to get them "on board".

Wisdom and storytelling
One of the most important and often
underestimated qualities the elderly possess is
the ability to tell a story. "We Catholics", says
Catherine, "have the greatest story ever told" and
this is something that the older generation can
pass on to their grandchildren. The only way to do
it is to introduce your young people to the story
of Jesus".

"Passing on the faith gets harder and harder in the way that we were brought up in the faith", she notes, "but the opportunities and challenges are magnificent because we live longer, we have more time to spend, more care to give, more wisdom to learn..."
